

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Carrie Nation's Own Gas

Is ethanol from corn a good biofuel? Is it a farm subsidy? I don't know, but I do know that nobody likes it in antique cars. Ethanol burns hot, adds oxygen, and tears up rubber parts in our old cars. If you've ever mixed scotch and water, you know that the two mix perfectly. Water dissolves in EtOH, and EtoH dissolves in water, and that's one more problem. The water that alcohol inevitably brings to any party causes havoc in fuel systems. More than that, Carrie Nations and her prohibition friends would not approve.

I've had various additives recommended to me, but I have no idea what they are and what they actually do. As we've all seen useless additives recommended over the years, by the same people who told us modern technology prevented oil spills and nuclear reactors from melting down, I'm naturally skeptical. It does seem that old cars really have problems with ethanol laced fuels. This may get much worse, as the EPA is going to increase the allowed percentage of EtOH. Searching Fort Lauderdale, I found two stations near me. I live pretty close to the water, so marinas are nearby. Two cycle motors have particular problems with ethanol, the fuel burns hotter, and destroys leaf blowers. (I hope my neighbor's yard crew does not know this).

Down at 17th Street Fisheries, conveniently located on 15th Street, the marina sells no-EtOH fuel. I pulled up to valet parking, was allowed to park myself (the joys of speaking Portuguese) and ambled over to the dock.

At such a fancy place, you can also buy various sundries, including Veuve Cliquot champagne and caviar. The bubbly is still more than the fuel, but in the same league, as marina gas is for boats, so it costs \$5.00 a gallon. Boaters have a more expensive hobby than even car people. Just think of it as a premonition of what we'll be paying this Summer. You have to load up in Jerry Cans, and fueling a '56 around the spare is not graceful, but you can do it. Today, my car runs on real, pure gasoline.

Is there a difference? I think there is. Subtle, but real. The car just seemed to have a bit more ocomph, a bit more smoothness, but I'm pretty sure the feeling was real, even if not measured.

I'm going to try this for a while, but there's another station that's closer, over in the port, and I hope it's more of a real station where I can use a pump, and maybe, just maybe, I'll have some money left for my own champers.



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
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Recap of Our Great Escape

On Thursday March 17th, Felipe with Christy, Gary with Amy and Felix with Daisy together with their respective Thunderbirds started the journey towards Clewiston the sweetest town in Florida. Upon our arrival at the historic Clewiston Inn we were joined with Leo and Valentina, Ernie and Judy and Richard and Ana. That's when the fun started. The first thing we did was as soon as we arrived was to hit the Everglades lounge to have drinks and enjoy the magnificent 360 degrees panoramic painting by West Palm Beach's J. Clinton Shepherd in 1945.

That evening to celebrate St Patrick's Day all 12 of us dressed in our favorite greens went to the Roland Martin's famous Scotty' Tiki Bar on Lake Okeechobee. It was karaoke night and our two famous artists Ernie and Judy gave their famous musical renditions. The crowd went wild clapping and whistling at their great performance.

The next morning Ed and Bobby joined the group for a great southern style breakfast. If you want to the have the best grits in the whole State of Florida you need to have them at the Clewiston Inn. By 10 am we were all ready to join the Sugarland Tour:

Southern Gardens Citrus:

The bus left town and took us to Southern Gardens Citrus, a huge citrus processing plant. Hundreds of citrus-laden trailers awaited their turn to be empted into a massive hopper to be conveyed into the highly automated juicing operations. Here the recovered juice is pasteurized, chilled and in some instances turned into concentrate. The vastness of the Southern Gardens Citrus operation was difficult to take in.

- •15 million orange trees around Lake Okeechobee.
- Machinery processing up to 20,000 oranges a minute.
- •600,000 gallons of juice are produced a day.

Nothing is wasted, we were told. All water is recycled. Orange peel, pulp and membrane are compressed into pellets and sold as cattle feed. The tour operator gave all of us a glass of OJ.

Sugar Plantation:

After the citrus tour we went into a cane field and were treated to a stalk of cane, sweet and fragrant. Thank god that Ed took _____ without him we wouldn't have been able to taste the cane. He took out his pocket knife and like the expert that he is started taking the peel off of the sugar cane and handed out piece to all of us. Thanks Ed. For me the only number that explained the vastness of sugar production is U.S. Sugar's 130 miles of private railroad track throughout its plantations.

Lunch:

We were taken back to a great buffet lunch at the Clewiston Inn. Ask Ernie he really enjoyed the fried fish and Southern fried chicken. By 1:30 we were on our way again!

Clewiston and its surroundings:

We drove by the historic homes of Sand Point and a ridge area or natural flood barrier built up by prevailing northwesterly winds. We drove around the marina areas and up on the dike. After a succession of hurricanes in 1926 and 1928 drowned thousands of residents, Herbert Hoover himself came to Clewiston and authorized the massive dike that eventually contained the entire 30-mile diameter of Lake Okeechobee except for a stretch of north shore.



US Sugar Corp refinery:

At the refinery, as with the citrus plant, are acres of machinery that take in muck land harvest and spit it out ready for the table: 50,000 tons a day become a million tons of sugar in a season.

Cane stalks go into cutters that chop it into 1-foot lengths to begin a process of squeezing, cooking, crystallizing and refining. Curiously, raw sugar has a molasses content that makes it unpalatable to ants and vermin, so it can be warehoused in huge open piles. Ask Felix, as he could not believe that these piles of sugar, that we eat, can be just piled in an open door warehouse and use back hoe trucks to move the piles.

The tour ended back at the Chamber of Commerce.

WOW! What a great day! I can't begin to tell you how much fun we had during our trip. I hope that our next trip on the Mystery Train will be just as much fun and can be joined by more members.
